RAILRIDERS BREAKDOWN

ABOUT LAST NIGHT: One night after suffering a shutout defeat, the SWB RailRiders flipped the script on the host Durham Bulls on Wednesday night, taking Game 2 of the Governors' Cup Finals, 4-0. **Domingo German, Anyelo Gomez** and **Nick Rumbelow** combined on the two-hit blanking, tying the best-of-five series, 1-1.

EL MATADOR: German (1-0) fired seven scoreless innings of one-hit ball, whiffing eight and walking three. He retired the final seven men he faced en route to the win. Including the regular season, German fired 20 scoreless innings over three starts against the Bulls in 2017.

BULLISH 'PEN: Gomez worked around a one-out infield hit by striking out Justin O'Conner and Johnny Field in succession in the eighth. Rumbelow, who allowed runs in just one of his 17 regular-season appearances with the RailRiders, enjoyed redemption against the lone team to tag him with a score. He bookended strikeouts around a Jake Bauers two-out double to cement the series-tying victory.

ROAD WARRIORS: The RailRiders did not allow a run on the road during last year's run to the IL's Governors' Cup crown. With their efforts on Wednesday night, the staff has posted shutouts in five of its last six road playoff games.

HOMEBOYS: The RailRiders will host Game 3 and Game 4, along with the if-necessary Game 5, at PNC Field. The winner of the series will represent the IL against the PCL champion in Tuesday's Gildan Triple-A National Championship Game, also in Moores. The RailRiders posted the IL's second-best home record on the regular season at 44-26.

DÉJÀ VU ALL OVER AGAIN: The SWB RailRiders splashed into the 2017 finals after dispatching of the nearby rival Lehigh Valley IronPigs in four games. The RailRiders out-scored the Pigs, 16-9, and held the edge in homers on the set, 4-1. **RailRiders pitching held the IronPigs to a 5-for-32 (.156) showing with men in scoring position.**

PLAYOFF HISTORY: SWB has made the Governors' Cup finals for the seventh time in franchise history (1992, 2000, 2001, 2008, 2009, 2016, 2017). SWB has claimed the IL North 12 times in its lore, including eight division titles in 11 seasons as the Yankees' top affiliate. The SWB franchise's first Governors' Cup crown came in 2008. **The then-SWB Yankees beat the Pawtucket Red Sox in four games and bested the Durham Bulls in four in the championship with a 20-2 win in clincher.** However, those then-SWB Yankees lost to the Sacramento River Cats (then-Oakland Athletics) in the "Bricktown Showdown", 4-1. This marks SWB's first trip to back-to-back finals since the 2008-09 teams. Both of those trips saw SWB face Durham for the right to hoist the Governors' Cup. As the Phillies' top farm club, the then-SWB Red Barons also made consecutive finals appearances in 2000 and 2001.

HIGH, FAR, GONE: The RailRiders boast seven players with double-digit homers this season. It marks the first time SWB has had seven or more 10+ homer hitters since the 2008 team had eight, paced by **Cody Ransom's** 22 big flies. The 2008 unit won the franchise's first-ever Governors' Cup title, beating Durham in four games in the finals including a 20-2 rout in the clincher. The SWB franchise record for homers in a season was set by the 1998 Red Barons with 164. The record as the Yankees' top affiliate (2007-Present) was set by the inaugural 2013 RailRiders at 133. **This year's RailRiders obliterated that mark with a new Yankees-era record and 2017 league-high 153 homers.**

OFF THE RAILS: The RailRiders posted the IL's best overall record at 86-55 (.610)... SWB's offense ranked among the IL's best in: R/G (1st, 4.7), AVG (1st, .272), OBP (1st, .334), SLG (1st, .442), OPS (1st, .775), 2B (T-2nd, 272), 3B (1st, 36), HR (1st, 153) and SB (6th, 93)... **No IL team had led the league in R/G, AVG, OBP and SLG in the same season since the 2004 Buffalo Bisons (Cleveland Indians).** Those Bisons won a league-best 83 games and the Governors' Cup title. The 2016 RailRiders paced the league in R/G, AVG, SLG and OPS, but ranked 2nd in OBP. The 2015 RailRiders led the IL in R/G, AVG, OBP and OPS, but finished 4th in SLG... SWB pitching ranks among the 2017 IL's best in ERA (1st, 3.33), WHIP (1st, 1.19) and K/9IP (2nd, 9.2)... SWB had 10 walk-off wins including seven in extras... The club owned the IL's best record in one-run games (23-13, .639) and in extras (9-1)... **No IL team had more wins when trailing after seven innings than the RailRiders (7)...** **SWB stood an IL-best 42-29 (.592) away from PNC Field...** With 1,249 strikeouts, the 2017 RailRiders became the first team in franchise history to eclipse 1,200K... SWB had a losing record against just two foes during the regular season, its vanquished first-round opponent, Lehigh Valley (7-11), and its combatant in the finals, Durham (3-4)... **Manager Al Pedrique** was named IL Manager of the Year for the second straight year... **He became the fourth IL skipper to earn the honor in consecutive years,** joining Rick Sweet (Louisville), Jack Tighe (Toledo) and Eddie Haas (Richmond) as the only managers to win it back-to-back years... Pedrique became the first SWB manager to win the award in consecutive seasons.

ON THE BUMP: **Chance Adams** was dubbed NYY's 8th-best prospect by *Baseball America* after '16 when he went a combined 13-1, 2.33 w/A+/AA while leading full-season MiLB starters in BAA (.169). He left AA this year 4-0, pacing the EL in ERA (1.03). He dominated in a May 31 win vs. COL (6IP, 1H, 0R, 2BB, CH 12K). On Aug. 21 he became the third hurler in the RailRiders era (2013-Present) to win double-digit games. He ranked among the IL's best in ERA (5th), WHIP (4th, 1.08) and BAA (1st, .197). He won at DUR Aug. 11 (6IP, 4H, 2R/1ER, 1BB, 6K, 1HR). On Fri. he won G2 at LHV to forge a 1-1 series tie (5IP, 5H, 2R, 4BB, 5K, 1WP).

Supplemental '14 2nd-nd'er (Walters St. CC), **Brent Honeywell** began '17 ranked TB's 2nd-best prospect by *Baseball America*. His arsenal inc. a screwball learned from dad, also Brent, who got it from a cousin, '74 NL Cy Young Mike Marshall. He began '16 A+ and despite missing 6 wks (DNP May 10-June 24, forearm soreness) was an AS: 10GS, 4-1, 2.41, .211, 0.96. His worst outing was his last, a loss July 5 vs. Bradenton (4.1IP, 7H, 6R, 3BB, 6K, 1HR). He ended '16 AA: 10GS, 3-2, 2.28, .231, 1.10. An AFL Rising Star '16, he began '17 AA (2GS, 1-1, 2.08, .100, 0.62). The MVP of the '17 Futures Game ranked among the IL's best in: Wins (T-3rd), K (2nd, 152) and K/9IP among starters (1st, 11.1). In 2GS vs. SWB: 0-0, 3.00, 12IP, 8H (.195 BAA), 4R, 0BB, 12K, 1HB, 1HR). He took a ND in Sat.'s first-round clincher at IND: 6.1IP, 9H, 3R, 1BB, 3K.

The Church of Baseball

AFFILIATION HISTORY: The Bulls have been a Triple-A squad since 1998. The entirety of their time at the highest minor league level has been spent as a Tampa Bay affiliate. Durham had been the top draw in the Advanced-A Carolina League before that. It was an affiliate of the Atlanta Braves for the entirety of that A-ball run from 1980-97. The team was founded in 1902 as the Durham Tobaccoconists. Through the years it has been an affiliate at many levels for each of the following big league teams as well: the Philadelphia Phillies, New York Mets, Houston Astros, Detroit Tigers, Boston Red Sox, Brooklyn Dodgers, Cincinnati Reds and New York Yankees in 1933.

WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS: Since making the move to Triple-A in 1998, the Bulls have won the International League's Governors' Cup four times (2002-03, 2009, 2013) and have played in the championship series 10 times with the losses coming in 1998, 1999, 2007, 2008, 2010 and 2014. The 2008 squad fell to SWB's first champion.

BULL DURHAM: The Durham Bulls enjoyed tremendous exposure thanks to the iconic 1988 romantic comedy starring Kevin Costner as "Crash" Davis, Tim Robbins as Ebby Calvin "Nuke" LaLoosh and Susan Sarandon as Annie Savoy. The film's name was not a flip of the script on the minor league team it chronicled. Instead, the town of Durham, N.C. had been called "Bull Durham" since the 1800s when the Blackwell Tobacco Company first sold "Bull" Durham tobacco. There really was a Lawrence "Crash" Davis who played for the Bulls. He got the nickname for colliding with a teammate for a fly ball. The film's writer/director, Ron Shelton, played five minor league baseball seasons for the Orioles including time with the IL's Rochester Red Wings from 1970-71.

DAP TO DBAP: The franchise spent most of its existence playing at the Durham Athletic Park or DAP before shifting to its current home, the 10,000-seat Durham Bulls Athletic Park, or DBAP, in 1995. The current digs hosted the Triple-A National Championship Game in 2012 and the Triple-A All-Star Game in 2014. The DAP and DBAP sit less than a mile away from each other.
