BOB RICHMOND, *League President*

This will be the 29th season that Bob Richmond has served as President of the NWL. He served as President from 1974-81 and 1991 to present.

Richmond graduated from the University of Oregon's School of Law in 1964 and began his career in professional baseball as the attorney for various clubs and leagues, including the NWL. Richmond has also served as President of the Arizona League since its inception in 1988. He is President of Baseball Opportunities, Inc., a consulting firm to Professional Baseball, and is co-owner of the Class AA Midland RockHounds.



TODD RAHR, *League Vice President*

Todd Rahr enters his 8th season with the Boise Hawks, seven years as the President/General Manager of the club. He served as the NWL Vice-President one other time in 2006. The Ohio University graduate started his baseball career as the Director of Media Relations in Savannah, Georgia twenty seasons ago and has been a part of professional baseball ever since. He has had stints as the Assistant GM in Eugene, Oregon (1994-1998); the General Manager in San Bernardino, California (1998-1999); and the VP/Baseball Operations in Springfield, Missouri (1999-2003) during his career. In 2006, Rahr was named the Northwest League Executive of the Year. He resides in Nampa, Idaho and has three kids, Zachary (20); Eli (15); and Megan (13).

JERRY WALKER, *League Secretary*

Jerry enters his 23rd season in the Northwest League. He was named the NWL's Executive of the Year and was recipient of the League's Joe Martin Award in 1997. Walker was instrumental in bringing baseball to Salem-Keizer as he spearheaded a private/public partnership to build a professional baseball stadium in Keizer. Jerry graduated from the University of Washington with a degree in marketing in 1976. He and his wife Lisa reside in Keizer, Oregon with their son Mickey.



BOISE HAWKS

Affiliated with the Chicago Cubs

The 2010 season marked the 24th consecutive year that the Boise Hawks, Class-A affiliate of the Chicago Cubs provided cost effective family friendly entertainment in the Treasure Valley. Although the team finished 3rd in the East Division with a 34-42 record, the Hawks had reason to be proud. The Hawks drew over 100,000 in attendance for the 24th straight season and finished approximately 1,000 fans ahead of last year's total. 105,671 witnessed Hawks baseball in 2010. Part of that crowd were kids and volunteers from the Hope House, Boys and Girls Clubs, Women's and Children's Alliance, Ronald McDonald House, ALS/MDA, Boys Scouts of America, Idaho Youth Ranch and the YMCA.

On the playing field, the 2010 season saw its ups and downs. The Hawks ended the first half of the season within an arms length of first place. They were able to make such a great run because of great young players like second basemen Pierre LePage and outfielder Matt Szczur. LePage finished the 2010 season as the only unanimous selection on the Northwest League All-Star team. Szczur meanwhile batted close to .400 before eventually heading back to football camp with FCS National Champion Villanova. The Hawks also received plenty of publicity from the story behind pitcher Juan Serrano. The 22 year-old Serrano defected from communist Cuba on a boat, landing in Mexico, before heading to the Dominican Republic, and eventually brought his 95 mph fastball to the United States. The Chicago Cubs have very big expectations for Serrano, and for many other 2010 Hawks.

The 2010 season marked the Ems first season in the new PK Park, shared with the University of Oregon. The Emeralds continued to draw 100,000 fans for 26 consecutive years, an ongoing short-season record. Another highlight of the 2010 season was the introduction of the Emeralds' biggest fan, and very first mascot, Sluggo! Sluggo has since been entertaining Ems fans in Eugene and the surrounding communities. The Emeralds also introduced "The Greatest Show on Turf," with a promotional schedule chalk full of fun family entertainment including weekly promotions like Fireworks Fridays and Lei-ed Back Sundays and individual theme nights like Star Wars Night, Animal House Night, Grateful Dead Night and the winner of a 2010 ESPN the Magazine Vecchie Award, Oregon Trail Night.

On the field, the Ems witnessed several top Padres come through the season. Third-round draft pick and third baseman Jedd Gyorko started the season with the Ems before being called up to Fort Wayne as well as top pitching prospect Matt Lollis. The Emeralds also said goodbye to long-time manager Greg Riddoch who retired after the 2010 season; 2010 marked his 11th season with the Ems and fourth with the Padres organization. The Ems finished the season 32-44 overall.

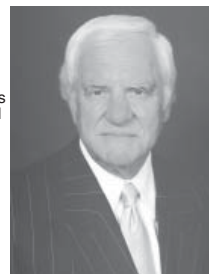

EVERETT AQUASOX

Affiliated with the Seattle Mariners

Continuing the proud tradition of being the first stop for Seattle Mariners minor leaguers on the road to Safeco Field, 2010 was indeed a historic year for the Everett franchise, which won its second ever Northwest League Championship – its first in 25 years and its first as a Seattle Mariners affiliate. In April, the AquaSox unveiled a new brand identity, which included new and updated logos – and uniforms. After a 7-0 start and a 27-11 first half, the AquaSox finished the 2010 season with a league best 49-27 record. The AquaSox led the Northwest League in many meaningful statistical categories including home runs (66) and team slugging percentage (.412); and, as impressively, the AquaSox staff ERA of 3.22 not only lead the Northwest League, but was the best ever in the club's previous 27 seasons. Infielder Kevin Mailloux, pitcher Anthony Fernandez and catcher Steven Baron were all named Northwest League All-Stars. Outfielder Kevin Rivers 1.022 OPS, which lead the NWL, was the second highest in franchise history.

SALEM-KEIZER VOLCANOES

Affiliated with the San Francisco Giants

The Volcanoes off season was highlighted as their parent club, the San Francisco Giants, won the World Series with seven former Volcanoes players earning World Series Rings. Those alumni include: Tim Lincecum, Buster Posey, Jonathan Sanchez, Pablo Sandoval, Travis Ishikawa, Nate Schierholz and Sergio Romo. Over the past fourteen years, the Volcanoes have claimed seven division titles and five Northwest League Championships (1998, 2001, 2006, 2007 & 2009). The franchise has received several national awards, most recently, the Volcanoes' were named 2007 National Minor League Team of the Year by MinorLeagueBaseball.com. The Volcanoes' Lisa Walker was named the Rawlings National Woman of the Year in Sports for 2005. In addition, the Volcanoes earned the Freitas Award as the Best Class A Short Season franchise in the nation. The team plays at Volcanoes Stadium in Keizer. The Stadium received a Design Award from the American Institute of Architects and was recognized by Baseball America as the 4th Best Class A Short Season ballpark in the United States, and #1 West of the Mississippi. The franchise began play in 1973 in Bellingham, Washington before moving to Salem-Keizer in 1997. Former franchise greats include: Ken Griffey, Jr., Edgar Martinez, Mark Langston, Omar Vizquel, Dave Stewart, Pedro Guerrero, Rick Sutcliffe & Mike Scoscia. Since the clubs relocation to Salem-Keizer, 61 former Volcanoes players have made it to the big leagues.

The Spokane Indians, Class-A affiliate of the Texas Rangers, led the Northwest League in attendance in 2010. This marks the 11th consecutive season that the team has lead the league in attendance. The Field at Avista Stadium was also awarded the Northwest League Field of the Year, marking the 12th time in the last thirteen seasons the Indians have taken home this award.

The Indians play all of their home games at beautiful Avista Stadium which has received over \$4 million dollars in renovations over the last few seasons. The stadium is set to receive additional improvements following the 2011 season. These upgrades will include remodeled offices, new main concession building and upgrades to the outer concourse. After the 2010 season Avista Stadium hosted the Rockstar Outdoor Hockey Classic that featured the Spokane Chiefs against the Kootenay Ice. This was the first ever outdoor game in the Western Hockey League.

TRI-CITY DUST DEVILS

The Tri-City Dust Devils set a franchise attendance record for the fourth consecutive year in 2010, as 84,921 fans walked through the gates at Gesa Stadium. It was the sixth consecutive year that the Dust Devils increased attendance, as attendance has increased every year since Hall of Fame third baseman George Brett purchased the team in 2004. During that time, numerous improvements have been made to the ballpark, renamed Gesa Stadium in 2008, including a sunshade structure, a new scoreboard, and new box seats.

The 2011 season will be the eleventh in Dust Devils history. An original member of the Northwest League and a five-time champion, Tri-City (Kennewick, Pasco, and Richland) welcomed affiliated professional baseball back to the community in 2001 after a 16-year absence. The Dust Devils have been affiliated with the Rockies since their founding.

NORTHWEST LEAGUE BEGINNINGS

The Northwest League has now completed its 56th season since its inception in 1955. Including its predecessor leagues, the NWL has existed since 1901. Because major-league baseball did not arrive on the west coast until the late 1950's, minor-league baseball prospered in the Northwest. Cities like Tacoma played the same role Eugene, Salem-Keizer, and Spokane do today.

Portland was the first champion of the Pacific Northwest League which was in existence in 1901-02. Butte won the championship in the Pacific National League which operated in 1903-04. The Northwestern League then came into play and lasted until 1918. Vancouver won five championships with Seattle getting four during this time. Everett shared the first crown with Vancouver while Aberdeen won the 1907 title outright. Spokane was the league champ in 1910 and 1916.

The Pacific Coast International League followed from 1919-22 before a 15 year drought occurred. The Western International League followed in 1937 and lasted until 1954 when it disappeared at a Friday-Saturday meeting and was replaced by the Northwest League on Sunday. Charter members of the present Northwest League include Eugene, Spokane and Yakima. The predecessor leagues operated under the "Class B" designation while the modern league is called "short-season Class A".

Over the last 50 years the Northwest League has produced some of the best talent ever seen. The following is a list of some of the players that went onto play in the major leagues: Sandy Alomar, Kevin Appier, Pedro Astacio, Rod Beck, Jose Canseco, Eric Davis, George Foster, Julio Franko, Tom "Flash" Gordon, Ken Griffey, Jr., Pedro Guerrero, Dave Henderson, Rickey Henderson, Reggie Jackson, Jeffery Leonard, Brian McRae, Rick Monday, Terry Mulholland, Eduardo Perez, Tim Salmon, Mike Scioscia, Terry Steinbach, Dave Stewart, Rick Sutcliffe, Todd Van Poppel, Matt Williams, Mitch Williams, and Trevor Wilson.

HISTORY & FUNCTION OF MINOR LEAGUE BASEBALL

The National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, now known as Minor League Baseball, was formed on September 5, 1901 from a meeting of Minor League executives at the Leland Hotel in Chicago. The President of the Eastern League, Patrick T. Powers, was elected as the first President of the NAPBL. Fourteen leagues and 96 clubs were members during the first season in 1902. The first NA office was established in Auburn, N.Y., under President Powers and successfully run by Secretary-Treasurer John H. Farrell. By the time Powers left office in 1909, there were 35 leagues and 246 clubs.

In 1910, Michael Sexton became President. In his first few years, wars between the Major Leagues and the outlaw Federal League hurt the Minors. The Federal League raided top Minor League teams, as well as National and American League teams, for players and territory. Sexton led a fight at the 1914 Winter Meetings to fight off a bid from radicals for the Minor Leagues to desert the Major Leagues and back the Federal League. For 22 years, Sexton presided over the Minor Leagues, leaving at the height of the Depression in 1932. But during his time, peace was restored and the Minor Leagues began to flourish.

At the Winter Meetings of 1932, Judge William G. Bramham was elected President. He served for 15 years. Bramham, who moved the NAPBL office to Durham, N.C., inherited 14 leagues and 102 clubs, but turned over 52 leagues and 388 clubs to George M. Trautman in 1947. During the height of World War II in 1943, the National Association had only 66 clubs and drew less than 6 million fans, an all-time low, but the end of the war would see fans again crowding into the ballparks in record numbers.

Trautman moved the office to Columbus, Ohio, as he began a 16-year reign as President. The year 1949 saw 59 leagues and 448 clubs, both all-time highs, attract 39,640,443 fans, a record that stood for 54 years. However, the advent of television and, in Trautman's last two years, Major League expansion, would begin to cut into attendance. Following Trautman's death in March 1963, Frank Shaughnessy served as interim president until Trautman's assistant, Phillip Piton, was elected in December 1963. There were 20 leagues and 132 clubs in 1964 and attendance was only 10 million. By the time Piton left office in 1971, membership was back to 155 clubs.

With the election of Henry J. Peters as President in December 1971, the NA was headed for another move. In September 1973, the office found its fourth home on Fourth Street South in St. Petersburg, Fla. Peters left in 1975 to become General Manager of the Baltimore Orioles. Robert R. "Bobby" Bragan became President in January 1976, and by 1978 there were 158 clubs. On March 28, 1978, the office moved five blocks to Bayshore Drive into the old clubhouse beside Al Lang Stadium, which was renovated and turned into an office building.

In January 1979, John H. Johnson took office. While the number of clubs stayed near 160-170, attendance skyrocketed. In 1987, more than 20 million fans attended games, a figure not matched since 1953. Franchise values also went up dramatically during Johnson's time. Johnson died on January 12, 1988 and Sal B. Artiaga was elected in April as the 9th President. His first year in office saw the Minor Leagues climb to over 21,659,000 in attendance with 188 clubs.

Mike Moore, who had been Chief Administrative Officer of the NA, was elected President during the 1991 Baseball Winter Meetings. One of his first moves after taking over in January 1992, was to convene a constitutional convention that would rewrite the National Association

Agreement, the by-laws that spell out the relationship between the NA and its member leagues. It was an agreement that had not materially changed in nearly a century of existence.

One of the most important changes was converting the National Association to more of a "corporate" structure than a "political" structure. The governing authority of the NA is vested in the President, working closely on policy and direction with the 17-member Board of Trustees (consisting of one club owner from each of the various leagues) and the Council of League Presidents (consisting of the Presidents of the various leagues.) The President is elected at an annual meeting of the Minor League Baseball membership for a four-year term.

The NA had phenomenal growth under the leadership of Moore, who retired in December 2007, after 16 years as President. In 1991, prior to becoming President, he established an agency agreement partnership between the Professional Baseball Promotion Corporation, a NAPBL subsidiary, and Major League Baseball Properties to authorize licensed merchandise on an international basis. From a humble beginning in the early 1990s, merchandise sales have averaged about \$45-million since 2000. The Promo Corp. branched out into national marketing in 1993, providing a central office that allows national sponsors to work with any number of Minor League teams on a local level or in any combination up to a national program. This, too, has had great success, starting from scratch and paying more than \$25 million in sponsorships to member clubs, since its inception.

There were several major accomplishments for the 1998 season, including the realignment of Triple-A baseball from three leagues into two and establishing the Triple-A World Series, which was played in Las Vegas (1998-2000). The Triple-A championship series resumed, in a one-game format played in Oklahoma City, in 2006. Another subsidiary, Professional Baseball Umpire Corp., was formed to operate and maintain the umpire program for the 16 domestic leagues, under terms of the historic 10-year Professional Baseball Agreement that was negotiated with Major League Baseball.

Minor League Baseball celebrated its centennial season in 2001 by attracting 38,808,339 fans, its third highest total in history at the time.

Minor League Baseball has been a continuing success story at the box office. The 2008 regular season attendance total of 43,263,740, established a new all-time record for the fifth straight year. Total regular season attendance has increased in 24 of the last 29 seasons and has surpassed 33-million for 16 straight years, a level not attained since the late 1940s when membership consisted of more than 50 leagues and more than 400 teams. In 2010, there were 15 leagues with 176 teams that charged admission.

Another important function of the National Association office is the running of Baseball's annual Winter Meetings, the convention of professional baseball, in conjunction with the Commissioner's Office. At the Winter Meetings, the Promo Corp. conducts the annual Baseball Trade Show, where merchandisers and manufacturers display the goods that will fill stadium novelty stands and souvenir shops in the year ahead, and conducts business seminars for member teams. The Promo Corp. also runs Professional Baseball Employment Opportunities (PBEO), which assists candidates seeking jobs in pro baseball.

Pat O'Conner took over as Minor League Baseball's 11th President in January 2008. He was elected to a four-year term, after serving as Chief Operating Officer, Moore's top aide, for 15 years.

Highlights of O'Conner's first two years in office include the realignment of two Class A leagues; the organization-wide bundling of internet rights; satellite operations and training centers at the historic Dodgertown complex in Vero Beach, Fla., and at the historic Durham Athletic Park in Durham, N.C.; expanded member input through revised organizational committee structure; a first-ever Diversity Initiative; a "Green Team" initiative to make Minor League Baseball teams and stadiums more eco-friendly and cost effective; and the location of new office space comprised of three buildings, totaling 14,000 square feet, on 16th Street North in St. Petersburg, Fla.
