
### Coca-Cola Field Year-by-Year Highlights

#### 1988 SEASON

March 7: In only 84 minutes, the Bisons sold more than 10,000 tickets for the opening of Pilot Field... April 14: Pilot Field opened and a sellout crowd of 19,500 watched as the Bisons defeated the Denver Zephyrs, 1-0... June 20: A sellout crowd watched the seventh annual National Old Timer's Baseball Classic. The nation viewed the Classic on ESPN... July 13: Another capacity crowd and a live national television audience watched as Buffalo hosted the first-ever Triple-A All-Star Game... August 17: The Bisons became only the second club in the history of minor league baseball to break the 1 million mark in attendance... August 19: The Bisons shattered the all-time minor league single-season attendance mark reaching 1,061,319 in total attendance... September 1: The Bisons concluded the season with a 2-1 victory over Nashville before the 22nd sellout



crowd of the season. The crowd established the all-time minor league single-season attendance mark of 1,186,651.




### Coca-Cola Field Year-by-Year Highlights

#### 1989 SEASON

**June 19**: The eighth annual National Old Timer's Classic was played before a crowd of 15,742. The game included Baseball Hall of Famer, and native of Buffalo, NY, Warren Spahn ESPN again televised the game to the nation...**August 17**: On the anniversary date of "Million Day," a sellout crowd pushed the club's season attendance total over the 1 million mark for a record second straight season.

#### 1990 SEASON

January 29: Phase 1A Construction began at Pilot Field to add 1,400 bleacher seats, a 5,000-foot standing-room-only area on the Mezzanine level and 30% more space in the tent area...April 16: Pilot Field opened its third season before a sellout crowd...June 1: Phase 1A Construction was completed, bringing the seating capacity to 20,900 and an additional 150 spaces for standing room only...June 3: The largest crowd ever to see a game at Pilot Field (21,050) enjoyed a post-game Beach Boys concert...August 18: A crowd of 17,336 pushed the Bisons' attendance over the 1 million mark for the third straight season...September 4: Nashville defeated the Bisons, 4-3, in 18 innings and 5:08 in a one-game playoff for the American Association Eastern Division Championship.



#### 1991 Season

March 25: The National League Expansion Committee visits Pilot Field as part of its tour of the 6 contending cities...April 17: A sellout crowd of 21,050 was on hand for Pilot Field's fourth opener...May 9: The Pittsburgh Pirates visit for a pre-game charity home run-hitting contest and a seven-inning exhibition game. The Pirates' Barry Bonds became the first player to homer over the centerfield fence during the home run contest before the Bisons won the game, 4-2...June 14: 21,050 fans filled Pilot Field for the first home game after the National League's announcement that Buffalo would not be receiving an expansion franchise...August 15: The Bisons passed the million mark in attendance for the fourth consecutive season... August 31: The Herd captured their first American Association Eastern Division title in front of 21,050 with a 6-4 win over Louisville...September 5: Buffalo defeats Denver, 4-1, in the first post-season game at Pilot Field...September 6: The 50th sellout in the history of Pilot Field gives Buffalo a minor league attendance record of 1,240,951.

#### 1992 SEASON

May 3: Jose Tolentino hits the first home run in game competition over the centerfield fence...May 29: The Bisons surpass the 5 million mark in all-time attendance at Pilot Field...August 24: Buffalo's season attendance passes 1 million for the fifth consecutive season...September 5: Buffalo defeated Nashville, 3-1, to clinch its second consecutive American Association Eastern Division championship.

#### 1993 Season

May 6: Pittsburgh made its second visit to Buffalo for a seven-inning exhibition game and a charity home run-hitting contest...August 28: A crowd of 18,256 pushed Buffalo's season attendance over the 1 million mark for a sixth consecutive season. Following the game, the 10-year anniversary of the filming of "The Natural" was celebrated as the movie's final scene was re-enacted on the field.

#### 1994 Season

**April 14**: Buffalo opened Pilot Field's seventh season with a 3-2 last-at-bat win over Omaha ...**April 16**: The 7 millionth ticket is sold at Pilot Field...**June 26**: Actor John Stamos plays drums for the Beach Boys as they perform at the ballpark... **August 6**: John Hope became the first Bisons pitcher to homer at Pilot Field with a solo shot to left field...**September 8**: Buffalo signs a 2-year working agreement with the Cleveland Indians.

#### 1995 SEASON

March 2: The City of Buffalo terminates Pilot Freight's naming rights on the downtown ballpark...April 25: The Cleveland Indians defeat Buffalo, 2-1, in an exhibition game...May 4: ESPN2 visits Buffalo and airs its first-ever minor league base-ball game...June 17: Celebration of Baseball visits Buffalo as several Hall of Famers and baseball greats play an exhibition game against local players...July 3: North AmeriCare Park becomes the new name of Buffalo's downtown ballpark as North American Administrators agree to a 13-year deal...July 7: The first-ever women's baseball team, the Silver Bulletts, takes the field in an exhibition game against local players...September 15: The Bisons lose Game 5 to Louisville, 8-2, for the American Association Championship...December 27: Ground-breaking begins for a new design on the home run fence dimensions.

#### 1996 SEASON

**April 8**: North AmeriCare Park celebrates its ninth Opening Day as the Herd shuts out Indianapolis, 4-0...**June 24**: Buffalo and Cleveland tie, 3-3, in an exhibition game before a sold-out crowd...**July 4**: The Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra performs before a capacity crowd and the Bisons unveil a new version of their home blue jerseys...**September 10**: Buffalo was defeated by Indy, 5-1, eliminating the team from the playoffs.

#### 1997 SEASON

April 4: The Bisons draw the largest Opening Day crowd (19,576) in the minor leagues and beat the Nashville Sounds, 4-3, in 11 innings...June 20: Buffalo tops the 10-million mark in paid attendance since the opening of the ballpark in 1988. On the same night, Bartolo Colon (right) pitches Buffalo's first no-hitter since 1952 and the first ever at North AmeriCare Park...July 14: Jeff Manto becomes the first Bisons player to hit 3 home runs in one game at North AmeriCare Park ...July 25: The Bisons turn the first triple play in North AmeriCare Park history...September 9: Buffalo defeats the Iowa Cubs, 6-3, to take a 2-0 lead in the American Association Championship Series. Buffalo wraps up the title a day later at Sec Taylor Stadium in Des Moines, Iowa.

#### 1998 SEASON

**April 10**: The Bisons returned to the International League with a 4-0 shutout victory against the Rochester Red Wings...**July 3**: Before a sellout crowd the Bisons defeat the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre Red Barons, 8-7. Bisons fans are treated to the BPO Independence Eve celebration following the game...**September 2**: Alex Ramirez hits his 34th home run of the season in a game against Syracuse, setting the highest home run total for a Bison in the Modern Era...**September 3**: A crowd



of 13,496 pushes the Bisons season attendance total to 706,157 to break the former International League record set by the Ottawa Lynx in 1993...September 9: Alex Ramirez becomes the first player to hit for the cycle at North AmeriCare Park in a 7-3 win against the Syracuse SkyChiefs in Game 1 of the first round of the International League playoffs...September 11: The Bisons defeat the Syracuse SkyChiefs, 6-0, in Game 3 eliminating their Thruway rival and advancing to the International League Governors' Cup Finals...September 15: A 6-3 win over the Durham Bulls gives the Bisons a 2-0 lead in the Governors' Cup Finals. The Bisons would eventually win the title in Durham.

#### 1999 SEASON

**April 8:** The new Big Board is unveiled before the largest 1999 Opening Day crowd in the minor leagues (19,699). The 20' x 40' state-of-the-art video board is "turned on" with a giant remote control by Buffalo Mayor Anthony Masiello and Erie County Executive Dennis Gorski...**May 8:** Jeff Manto hits his 53rd career home run in a Bisons uniform off Richmond hurler Derrin Ebert surpassing teammate Alex Ramirez for the Bisons modern day home run record...**July 3:** The Bisons defeat the Toledo Mud Hens 2-1. Following the game 17,271 fans are treated to the annual Independence Eve Fireworks Celebration with the BPO...**September 5:** The Bisons'Fan Appreciation Night crowd of 19,910 outdraws 6 MLB teams that day: Philadelphia (18,839), Pittsburgh (17,901), Tampa Bay (17,480), Florida (15,875), Kansas City (15,315) and Montreal (8,302).

#### 2000 SEASON

**July 3**: A crowd of 19,729 fills the seats for the Independence Eve Celebration with the BPO...**September 9**: The Bisons drop a 10-1 decision vs. Scranton in the fourth and final game of a five-game series in the first round of the IL playoffs. That night's attendance pushes Buffalo's per-game average over 10,000/game, to lead all International League teams.

## Coca-Cola Field Year-by-Year Highlights

#### 2001 SEASON

April: The Bisons, under new skipper Eric Wedge, opened the season by winning all 6 games of the Opening Homestand...May: Bisons set a record for most wins in a month with 22 wins and just 6 losses...June 25: Bisons play their 1000th game at Dunn Tire Park...July 3: 20,050 fans filled the stands to celebrate the country's birthday with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and fireworks...August 17: The Bisons retire Jeff Manto's #30 (left). Manto's number joins Ollie Carnegie's and Luke Easter's as the team's retired numbers...August 27: A fan wins \$10,000 as part of the Bisons Mega Money Monday. This was the second time this season a fan won \$10,000. September 2: Annual Fan Appreciation, over 16,000 fans watched the Bisons beat the Red Wings to finish the season with a 91-51 record. The Bisons winning percentage of .641 was the fourth highest in 116 years of professional baseball in Buffalo as well as the best record in the Modern Day Era...September 9: The Bisons drop a 6-2 decision to Scranton in a 19-inning Game 5 of the first round of the playoffs.



#### 2002 SEASON

**April 10:** The Bisons open their 117th home season with a 3-2 loss at the hands of the Ottawa Lynx in front of 14,038 fans.... **May:** Over 13,000 school kids attend School Kids Day at Dunn Tire Park and listen to a presentation done by the late Jackie Robinson's daughter...**July 1:** This month opens with an exhibition game against parent Cleveland in front of 18,336 and includes the annual BPO firework extravaganza in front of 19,122 two days later...**August:** Dunn Tire Park's largest crowd ever (21,050) concludes the regular season with fireworks at Fan Appreciation Night...**September:** The Bisons sweep by the Scranton Wilkes Barre Red Barons 3-0 in the first round of the Governor's Cup Playoffs, eventually losing to Durham in the Finals.

#### 2003 SEASON

**April 3:** The Bisons open the season with a 10-8 win over the Pawtucket Red Sox in front of a crowd of 12,720. The final six games of the season-opening homestand are postponed due to snow/freezing rain...**May 19:** A School Kids Day attendance record is set as 14,406 see the Bisons defeat Indianapolis 3-1...**July 3:** The first sellout of the season (20,050) enjoys the fireworks extravaganza with the BPO...**September 1:** 14,238 see the Bisons end the 2003 season with a 2-1 loss to Rochester on Fan Appreciation Night.

#### 2004 SEASON

April 16: On Opening Day, the Bisons debut the new Heron's Landing Party Deck in right field in front of 17,104. The Bisons lose to Ottawa, 10-5...May 22: Trailing Norfolk 8-1 in the 8th inning, Buffalo comes back to win, 9-8...June 21: Bisons defeat Indianapolis 8-7 despite trailing 7-0 in the 2nd inning...June 22: Bisons complete their second, 7-run comeback in 24 hours, defeating Indianapolis 12-11 despite trailing 9-2 in the 5th inning...July 2: The Bisons break a Dunn Tire Park record with 7 home runs in a 16-2 over Syracuse...July 3: A sellout crowd of 17,950 on BPO Night watch the Bisons complete their fourth, 7-run comeback of the year in a 9-8 win over Syracuse...July 16: The third longest game in Dunn Tire Park history as Scranton/WB defeats Buffalo, 8-3, in



16 innings and 5:07 in the second game of a doubleheader...July 27: Chris Clapinski hits his third Dunn Tire Park Grand Slam of the season, a record for a Bisons in a career, not just a single-season...August 13-15: Jhonny Peralta completes a record-breaking weekend at DTP by setting the Modern Era mark for hits, runs and doubles in a season...September 12: In the first round of the playoffs, the Bisons defeat the Durham Bulls, 7-0, in Game 5. It's the first time the Bisons have trailed a five-game series, 2-0, and came back to win...September 17: The Bisons defeat the Richmond Braves, 7-1, in Game 4 of the Governors' Cup Finals to win the International League Championship...October 1: Thousands of fans come to Dunn Tire Park to honor the Bisons Championship season.

### Coca-Cola Field Year-by-Year Highlights

#### 2005 SEASON

April 7: Opening Day at Dunn Tire Park is postponed due to rain, but returning players receive their 2004 Governors' Cup Championship Rings in a pre-game ceremony. Buffalo and Richmond split a doubleheader the following day... May 23: Andy Abad hits a pinch-hit, three-run, home run in the bottom of the 11th inning to defeat Charlotte, 10-7, in front of 12,910 on School Kid's Day...June 2: Dusty Wathan becomes just the second Bison in Dunn Tire Park history to hit 3 home runs in a game as Buffalo defeats Toledo, 13-1. Wathan also sets the Modern Day team record with 9RBI in the game...June 5: Bisons hold Tim Russert Day, with the nationally-respected host of Meet the Press visiting Dunn Tire Park. Buffalo falls to Columbus in the game, 14-12...June 26: In one of the scariest moments in the ballpark's history, Bisons pitcher Kyle Denney is struck in the head with a line drive from Durham's Joey Gathright. Denney suffers a fractured skull, but returned to the team later in the year (DNP) ...July 3: A sellout crowd of 18,025 enjoys a Bisons 10-1 win over Ottawa and a post game concert from the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra...August 24: Dusty Wathan hits a home run in the bottom of the 11th to lead the Bisons past Syracuse, 11-10. Buffalo trailed in the game, 7-0, in the 2nd inning. The Herd pitching staff sets a Modern Era team record with 18 strikeouts...September 11: The Bisons fall to Indianapolis, 6-4, in Game 5 of the IL Semi-Finals, ending their pursuit of back-to-back Governors' Cup Championships.



#### 2006 SEASON

April 14: On the 18th Anniversary of the first ever game played at Dunn Tire Park, the Bisons defeat the Columbus Clippers, 10-1, in their Home Opener...May 7: In between games of a doubleheader sweep of Ottawa, the Bisons unveil their new mascot, Belle "The Ballpark Diva"...May 19: Jeremy Sowers throws a complete-game one-hit shutout against Pawtucket in the first game of a doubleheader (1-0 Win)...June 1: The Bisons match a Modern Day record for margin of victory with a 15-0 win over Durham...June 4: The Bisons are swept by the Bulls in a doubleheader that lasts a combined seven hours and 37 minutes. In a bizarre moment in the 11th inning of the 16-inning nightcap, a seagull is hit with a pitch from Durham's Jason Childers before it reaches the plate...June 19: Andy Marte matches a Bisons All-Time record with a home run in his fifth consecutive game...July 3: The Bisons defeat Rochester, 7-1, before a sold-out crowd of 18,025 as the team celebrates Independence Eve with a post-game show from the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus...July 8: Ben Francisco goes 1-4 to extend his hit-streak to 25 games, the second longest in the Modern Era...July 26: Jeremy Guthrie tosses a complete-game one-hitter in a 3-1 win over Louisville...August 8: Trailing 9-5 with two outs in the 9th, the Bisons storm back to defeat Ottawa, 12-9, thanks to Jason Dubois' three-run walk-off home run.

#### 2007 SEASON

April 9: The Bisons finally start their 20th season at Dunn Tire Park with an 8-3 win over Ottawa. All four games scheduled against Richmond, April 5-8, are postponed due to snow and icy conditions...May 5: Buffalo and Pawtucket restart a suspended game form April 23 with the Red Sox leading 3-0 in the first inning. Pawtucket builds a 14-6, but the Bisons storm back with nine runs in the bottom of the ninth for a 15-14 win. Infielder Trent Durrington, inserted as the pitcher in the top of the inning to save the bullpen, gets the win. Buffalo wins a second game that night, 5-0...June 4: The Bisons beat Toledo, 9-3, in front of 14,378 on School Kids Day...June 20: Buffalo sweeps a doubleheader from Louisville. Aaron Laffey throws a complete-game two-hitter in game one. It's one of a record six games he'll win in June...July 3: The Bisons fall to Rochester, 10-2, before a sold-out crowd of 18,025 as the team celebrates Independence Eve with the a post game show from the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus...August 25: Buffalo defeats Scranton/WB, 6-1, in front of a crowd of 17,350. The team pays tribute to "20 Years Together Downtown" with ceremonies before, during and after the game. Former Mayor Jimmy Griffin, "The Earl of Bud" and The BUTCHer are among the special guests that return to honor Dunn Tire Park.

### Coca-Cola Field Year-by-Year Highlights

#### 2008 SEASON

**June 4:** Trailing 6-0 in the 9th inning, Buffalo scores 6 in the 9th and twice more in the 10th inning to defeat Rochester, 8-7 (10 innings)...**June 27:** An amazingly thick fog rolls into Coca-Cola Field and forces the suspension of a game against Scranton/WB in the 9th inning. The infielders cannot be seen from the pressbox and the Yankees score a run in the top of the ninth to tie the game 1-1 on two flyball doubles lost by outfielders. The next day, the Bisons win the game, 2-1, in 10 innings...**July 3:** The Bisons fall to Rochester, 7-6 in the longest Independence Eve Celebration game in park history (13 innings). A crowd of 17,583 push the event's attendance over the quarter-million fan mark in its 15th season...**August 19:** Outfielder Jason Cooper enters the game as a defensive replacement in the 8th inning, marking his Modern Era record-401st game with the Bisons.

#### 2009 SEASON

April 9: The Bisons take the field on Opening Day as the new Triple-A affiliate of the New York Mets. It's also the first game for the newly-named Coca-Cola Field. The Herd falls to Pawtucket, 9-6...July 18: The Bisons get back-to-back complete game shutouts from Jonathon Niese and Nelson Figueroa to win both games of a doubleheader over Gwinnett (1-0, 2-0)...August 20: Forty-year old rookie Ken Takahashi throws a complete game shutout in the shortest game in the Bisons Modern Era. The southpaw needs just one hour and 21 minutes and 71 pitches to defeat Syracuse, 2-0, in the second game of a doubleheader...September 1: The Bisons turn just the second triple play in Coca-Cola Field history. SS Argenis Reyes makes a diving grab on Rochester's Steve Tolleson's liner. Reyes then throws to 2B Luis Rivera who inturn relays to 1B Mike Lamb to catch two runners off base. The play is #5 of ESPN's Top 10 Plays later that night.

#### 2010 SEASON

April 14: After starting the season on the road, the Bisons defeat Pawtucket 8-2 in front of 13,323 fans at the club's Home Opener...April 29: After allowing a leadoff single to Durham's Fernando Perez on an 0-2 pitch, Bisons pitcher R.A. Dickey retires a modern era record 27 batters in a 4-0 win over the Bulls. The game lasts just one hour, 45 minutes, the shortest nine-inning game in Coca-Cola Field history... May 27: Longtime IL slugger Mike Hessman hits his first ever walk-off home run to lead the Bisons to an 8-7 win in 10 innings over Toledo on School Kids Day... **June 3:** A crowd of 14,774 attend a Bisons' 7-1 loss to Syracuse in a game featuring Washington Nationals' mega-prospect, RHP Stephen Strasburg. The VERSUS Network carries the game live to a national audience, the network's first ever broadcast of a professional baseball game...June 14: Trailing 6-3 in the 9th inning, Fernando Martinez hits the second ever walk-off grand slam in Coca-Cola Field history...June 18: Valentino Pascucci becomes just the third Bisons player to hit three home runs in a game at Coca-Cola Field. The slugger drives in five in a 6-4 win over Indianapolis... July 2: In a 12-4 win over Rochester, Lucas Duda ties a Bisons all-time record by homering in his fifth straight game...July 3: The Bisons fall to Rochester 1-0 in front



of 17,572 on the team's annual Independence Eve Celebration with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus...August 18: Dillon Gee strikes out eight batters in a 7-6 win over Rochester. In the process, Gee breaks the modern era single season strikeout record of 137. He finishes the season with 165 punchouts...September 8: Just two days after the conclusion of the 2010 season, bulldozers from Sports Construction Group begin a two-month long project to replace the 23-year old drainage system at Coca-Cola Field. Over 600 truckloads of dirt are hauled out to reach the drainage system some 18 inches below the ground. Later in the off-season, the Bisons announce plans to install the largest scoreboard in all of minor league baseball (nicknamed "BisonsTV HD").


#### 2011 SEASON

April 7: Fans enjoy their first glimpse of the Bisons TV HD Board, the largest HD scoreboard in minor league baseball, as the Bisons open up the 2011 season with an 8-5 loss to Syracuse...June 9: The Bisons defeat the Indianapolis Indians, 15-2, much to the delight of 14,412 on the annual School Kids Day...June 19: OF Nick Evans goes 5-5 in a 6-4 victory over Lehigh Valley. Evans hit streak reaches 19-games, over which he has averaged .514 (38-74)...July 3: The Bisons fall to the Chiefs, 10-4, before the team's annual Independence Eve Celebration with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus... August 18: Bisons manager Tim Teufel and the Herd fall to Toledo, 4-0. The winning pitcher for the Mud Hens is Triple-A rookie and Tim's son, Shawn Teufel...August 29: Bisons OF Jesus Feliciano collects his 100th hit of the season, becoming the first Bisons player in the modern era to collect 100+ hits in three consecutive seasons.

#### 2012 SEASON

April 11: Bisons set an Opening Day record with 12 runs in a 12-3 victory over the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre Yankees...May 19: A day after his 20-game hit streak ended, outfielder Vinny Rottino hits three home runs and drives in five in an 11-6 win over Indianapolis... May 24: The Bisons defeat Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, 6-2, in the first of six games the Herd will serve as the 'road team' at Coca-Cola Field. The Yankees are displaced the entire season by renovations to their ballpark...July 3: The Bisons host their annual Independence Eve Celebration with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus. Buffalo picks up the 5-4 win on Jordany Valdespin's walk-off RBI-single...July 9: Festivities for All-Star Week begin with the Triple-A Home Run Derby. New England Patriots tight end and Williamsville-native Rob Gronkowski wins the Celebrity Derby while hometown hero Valentino Pascucci wins the Home Run Derby with 22 home runs, several of which land onto Oak St. A crowd of 17,244 take in the event...July 11: A sold out crowd of 18,025 welcome the return of the 25th Annual All-Star Game to Buffalo. Broadcast live throughout the nation on the MLB Network, the Pacific Coast League defeats the International



League, 3-0, despite two shutout innings from Bisons All-Star and IL Top Star, Matt Harvey...**September 17:** The Bisons announce a player development contract with the Toronto Blue Jays, becoming Toronto's top minor league affiliate...**November 20:** The Bisons unveil their new primary logo featuring a red, white and blue color scheme.

A total of 48,802 fans come to Coca-Cola Field during Reyes' four-game injury assignment with the club, June 21-24 (3-1 record)...July 3: The Bisons host their annual Independence Eve Celebration with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus and a crowd of 17,208 see the Herd fall to the Red Wings, 11-1...August 29: The Bisons host their annual Fan Appreciation



Night and use a pinch-hit home run in the 8th inning from Luis Jimenez to defeat the Red Wings, 3-2. During an inning break, the Bisons announce a two-year extension of their player development contract with the Toronto Blue Jays, becoming Toronto's top minor league affiliate through the 2016 season.

#### 2014 SEASON

April 3: Bisons win 6-3 victory over the Rochester Red Wings on Opening Day in front of a crowd of 11,052...June 7: Star Wars Night sells out once again as a crowd of 18,025 watch the Bisons fall to the Syracuse Chiefs, 6-3...July 3: The Bisons annual Independence Eve Celebration with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus reaches its 20th season. A crowd of 16,505 see the Herd fall to the RailRiders, 4-1...August 11: Outfielder Darin Mastroianni collects a straight steal of home in a 5-0 shutout win over Norfolk...August 12: Blue Jays All-Star slugger Edwin Encarnacion joins the Bisons on an MLB injury rehab assignment and hits the Bisons first grand slam in almost two years in a 7-5 win over the Tides... August 22: The Bisons announce that after the 2014 season, the City of Buffalo will install new seats in the 'special reserved' section of the ballpark. When completed in the off-season, the ballpark's new seating capacity is reduced to 17,600...August 24: First baseman Brett Wallace hits three home runs, including a walk-off grand slam in the bottom of the 12th inning, in a 10-6 victory over the Pawtucket Red Sox.

Outfielder Ian Parmley earns the win for Buffalo while Rowdy Tellez hits the walk-off two-run homer off PawSox infielder, Mike Miller...June 2: Another sold out crowd enjoys the 10th annual Star Wars Night and a 4-0 victory over the Knights. At 16,907, it is the largest-attended minor league game of the year...July 3: The Bisons get a very symbolic spot start as former Army First Lieutenant Chris Rowley takes the ball for the 23rd annual KeyBank Independence Eve Celebration and leads the Herd to a 6-2 victory over Syracuse. In his first Triple-A start,



Rowley strikes out six and allows just one run over five innings for the win...
