RAILRIDERS BREAKDOWN

HOME: 12-5 AWAY: 8-11 STREAK: W 4 LAST 5: 4-1 LAST 10: 6-4

LAST TIME OUT: The RailRiders captured their fifth straight win at PNC Field on Tuesday night thanks to a big evening from **Mike Ford**. The first baseman drove in four as the RailRiders defeated the PawSox, 7-2. The PawSox have lost six straight. **Tyler Webb (3-0)** earned the victory by holding Pawtucket to a run over 3.1 innings in relief. The southpaw fanned six. Henry Owens (3-2) shouldered the loss after allowing five runs on six hits in his 4.2 frames of work. He issued a season-worst seven walks.

T-WADE: **Tyler Wade** walked twice and scored a run. His 12 steals have him one off the pace of Gwinnett's Ozzie Albies for tops in Triple-A. Wade is on pace to post 47 steals this season. The franchise's single-season record of 44 was set by **Tommy Barrett** in 1989. Since the start of May, Wade has gone 22-for-62 over 14 games, slashing .355/.437/.597/1.033. He made his first career start in center field on May 8 at Pawtucket and got his first nod in right field on May 16 vs. the Paw Sox. He had no outfield experience and just one start at third base in regular-season play entering 2017. On April 29, May 6 and May 14, he drew starts at the hot corner and first tasted the outfield with an April 30 nod in left. His first-ever outfield time came in the 2016 Arizona Fall League when 16 of his 18 games played saw him start in the outfield (5-RF, 4-LF, 7-CF).

STONEMASON: **Mason Williams** carved out a 2-for-4 night with two steals and a run scored. After he hit .194 (13-for-67) in 20 April games played, Williams has hit .317 (19-for-60) in 14 games this month with four swipes. In five games played against the PawSox, the Pawtucket native has gone 10-for-20 (.500) with two RBIs and four runs scored.

SIMPLY THE BEST: **Rob Refsnyder** extended the league's best active hitting streak to 16 games with a 2-for-3 day. During his run, Refsnyder has gone 22-for-61 (.361) with a .443 OBP.

STOP, THIEVES!: SWB leads the IL in caught-stealing efficiency at 47% (14 of 30 caught). **Eddy Rodriguez** stands as the IL's top catcher in the category. He has nabbed seven men in 13 attempts (54%).

YOUNG GUNS: Wade, Fowler and **Clint Frazier**, the RailRiders' usual 1-2-3 hitters early this season, are all 22 years old. The IL's mean-average age for position players early this season stands a shade under 27. SWB boasts the IL's third-youngest group of position players (LHV-24.5, DUR-24.8, SWB-25.0).

THE OFFENSIVE: SWB's offense ranks among the IL's best in: R/G (2nd, 4.9), AVG (1st, .275), OBP (1st, .346), SLG (1st, .435), OPS (1st, .781), 2B (1st, 83), 3B (1st, 11) and SB (3rd, 33).

HOME COOKING: SWB has won a season-best five straight at home and stands 12-5 at PNC Field. Only the Durham Bulls (15-5) have a better home winning percentage in the IL than the RailRiders.

TRIPLE THREAT: **Dustin Fowler** co-leads MiLB with seven triples and is on pace to triple 28 times. The single-season franchise record is 16, set by **Shane Victorino** during his 2005 IL MVP campaign.

CATCH IT HERE: PNC Field will host the 2017 Gildan Triple-A National Championship Game on Sept. 19 at 7:07 p.m. For tickets or more information, please call 570-969-BALL (2255) or visit swbrailriders.com. The RailRiders claimed the franchise's second-ever Governors' Cup as IL champs and the team's first-ever Triple-A national title with a win over El Paso in 2016.

ON THE BUMP: Signed by NYM as a 3B in '08, hitting woes shifted **Luis Cessa** to P. He rose as a DSL P in '11 to AAA in '15. He has since been traded 2x. First a July '15 deal from NYM to DET in a package for Yoenis Cespedes. That off-season DET added him to the 40, then traded him that Dec. to NYY w/RHP **Chad Green** for LHP **Justin Wilson**. He began '16 in NYY pen and bounced between SWB (15G/14GS, 6-3, 3.03, .235 BAA, 1.15 WHIP) and NYY (17G/9GS, 4-4, 4.35, .241, 1.11). He started SWB's '17 home opener vs. LHV (7IP, 6H, 0R, 2BB, 6K). He comes off a loss at SYR on Fri. (3+IP, 10H, 9R/8ER, 3BB, 2K).

An OAK '08 33rd-rd'er (994th overall) out of Harvard, **Shawn Haviland** was an AS w/A Kane County in '09 and A+ Stockton in '10. In '10 he led OAK's farm w/169K and got his first AAA taste. He struggled in '11 w/AA Midland (6-12, 7.08, 24HR in 143.2IP) and repeated '12 (6-8, 4.80, 11HR in 120IP). He missed '13 recovering from TJ. On the mend in '14, he went 8-9, 3.82 (A+/AA). He signed w/CHW as MiLB FA in '15: 19G/13GS w/CHA 4-5, 4.19, .272, 1.32, 10HR in 77.1IP. He spent the end of '15 w/PAW (6GS, 1-5, 4.17, .289, 1.36). He split '16 w/COL (7GS, 2-2, 3.40, .258, 1.20) and Indy New Britain (22G/13GS, 3-4, 3.34, 1.36). In '17 w/PAW, 5 of his 6GS have been quality but the team is 2-4 in those games.

THEY WERE THE CHAMPIONS: Wildcard entrants to the 2014 IL playoffs, the PawSox took down IL North champion Syracuse and IL South champ Durham to win their fourth Governors' Cup. That added to crowns claimed in 1973, 1984 and 2012.

BOLES' BIO: At 42, **Kevin Boles** is the IL's second-youngest manager. Before he arrived and hoisted the Governors' Cup in his first season, the now-third-year IL skipper spent three seasons managing Double-A Portland. He came to Boston in 2008 when he mentored Adv.-A Salem after stops with the Marlins, Royals and Twins. The son of former Marlins manager John Boles is a University of South Florida alumnus and was a Cubs' 42nd-rounder in 1998. Announced as Pawtucket's fifth manager in seven years, he followed Ron Johnson (2005-09), Torey Lovullo (2010), Arnie Beyeler (2011-12), and Gary DiSarcina (2013). Those four all hit the bigs directly from Pawtucket. Johnson-Boston 1B coach in 2010; Lovullo-Toronto 1B coach in 2011; Beyeler-Boston 1B coach in 2013; and DiSarcina-Angels 3B coach in 2014.

THE LONGEST GAME: Pawtucket shares a record that has stood since 1981. On April 18 that year, the PawSox and Rochester Red Wings started the longest game in pro baseball history. The 33-inning contest took eight hours and 25 minutes over three different days. It was not suspended until a little after 4 a.m. on April 19 due to the umpires not having a curfew rule in their rule book. IL president Harold Cooper called for the suspension. The game resumed June 23 and took 18 minutes to finish with Pawtucket's Dave Koza driving in the winner. Two future HOF players saw action in Rochester's **Cal Ripken, Jr.** (2-for-13) and Pawtucket's **Wade Boggs** (4-for-12) who tied the game in the 21st off of **Steve Luebber**.
